

We need to give the kitchen a good cleaning once the renovations are completed.


October seems to be shaping up to be an interesting month what with the Thanksgiving Hampers and Halloween on the way.

Speaking from strictly a non-political point of view, many of us who use the 'INTERNET' are deeply concerned with Canada's controversial anti-terrorism bill C-51 which has emerged as a key point in the current election campaign.

Pointing to it's big implications for privacy and surveillance, it is regarded as a commitment to national security and the possibility of additional anti-terror measures by some politicians. Last year concluded more than a decade of debate over 'lawful access' legislation by enacting a bill that provides new law enforcement powers for access to the internet and telecom data. The bill came just as reports revealed that telecom providers faced more than a million requests for such information each year and the Supreme Court of Canada issued its landmark <u>Spencer decision</u>, which ruled that Canadians have a reasonable expectation of privacy in their basic subscriber information, including name, address, and IP address. The upshot of the lawful access legislation and the court ruling is that Canada's leading telecom and internet companies reversed longstanding policies that granted warrantless access to basic subscriber information. Police can now rely on several new warrants to gain access to some information (including 'metadata' that can reveal extensive information about the who, when and where of internet and phone communications), but companies are typically refusing to disclose basic subscriber information without a warrant.

Despite an internal RCMP survey that concluded that the new requirements have had 'no significant negative effects', the tougher privacy standards have been under steady threat. Some lower courts have sought to distinguish the Supreme Court rulings and allow for access to subscriber information without a warrant. Meanwhile, law enforcement officials and government policy makers have quietly been working on a proposal to allow for real-time access to basic subscriber information. The Canadian Association of Chiefs of Police (CACP) revealed at its August annual conference that officials have partnered with the government to develop a 'reasonable law' in response to the <u>Spence decision</u>. With no comment on details regarding the proposed reforms, but a CACP document indicates that there are three possibilities under consideration. These include: (1) an administrative, non-judicial system that would allow for warrantless access without judicial oversight, (2) a new judicial order that would ensure that courts oversee disclosure , or (3) a combination of a new order that could be issued by an administrative body. The differences between the proposals sound technical, but at their heart raise the question of whether the government will support access to subscriber information.

The CACP indicates that the next scheduled meeting to discuss the issue is planned for November 2015, weeks after the end of the election campaign. The election could determine the future path of Canadian law on access to sub-scriber information. The issue requires answers to two questions: (1) the support or non-support for the Supreme Court's Spence decision (2) the notion of a reasonable expectation of privacy in subscriber information.

The answers to those two questions will go a long way in determining the privacy protection enjoyed by Canadian internet users, of which I am one.

HEALTH AND WELFARE

911 ???

The U.S. Customs and Border Protection Agency can turn away any Canadian from entrance citing the fact that they had been hospitalized for 'a mental-health episode'. To be able to enter the United States at some future date would require a 'medical clearance' from a U.S. approved doctor.

The hospitalization information being used comes from various Police Forces throughout Canada. When people have a problem they call '**911**'. 911 is operated by Canadian Police Departments who routinely make notes of events including suicide attempts and mental-health episodes. Some of this information is then added to the RCMP operated Police Information Centre (CPIC) database which is accessible to the U.S. Federal Bureau of Investigation and other American agencies such as the Department of Homeland Security.

Mental health advocates worry about the type of non-criminal data often collected by the police and shared with foreign governments. The minute you put mental health into police databases you run the risk of people making decisions based on that information. Frequently there is a wrong association between mental health and violence......that can lead to direct discrimination against an individual. An apparent police record of hospitalization for depression is enough to bar someone from entering the United States.

Under the 'U.S. Immigration and Nationality Act', border agents can reject travellers who are considered to have a physical or mental disorder that could pose a threat to property, safety, or welfare of themselves and/or others. U.S. border agents have turned back Canadians because of mental-health information contained in Canadian police files. If you're treated by a psychiatrist, much can be learned about the state of your health by a list of your medical appointments and the treatments you received.

It would be extremely troubling if people felt they couldn't phone the police or an ambulance because they were worried about the implications down the road by having the call on record.

THE INTERNET

The 'Computer Age' brought a WONDERFUL AND MARVELOUS era of unlimited information about almost any subject you can imagine. Although this is true, we must be careful while dealing with the internets many traps and snares. Care should always be taken while 'out on the net' as there are numerous elements that can be harmful to the consumer.

As a reminder, Health Canada has in the past warned Canadians about the issue of potentially counterfeit drugs sold on the web sites listed on the NABP <u>not recommended list</u>. The Canadian Regulatory Agency notes that prescription drugs for sale on certain sites in Canada have not been authorized for sale in Canada. The products sold on these sites resemble drugs approved in Canada and contain references to brand names which may lead Canadian consumers to believe the products are safe. Health Canada notes that these drugs are suspected to be counterfeit and it provides additional information available to the consumer. There is a potential that these drugs may contain various impurities and may have the possibility of serious harm to the consumer.
